

Later, Jesus saw the man in the Temple and told him, "Look, now you are well! Don't sin anymore. I don't want anything worse to happen to you."





**Narrator:** Now the man who had been healed did not know who it was, for Jesus had withdrawn, as there was a crowd in the place.






