

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
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JESUS IS THE NEW LEADER

One day, our Lord Jesus Christ told a parable, a story with a special meaning, to some of the important leaders in the Hebrew faith. He told them, "Once upon a time, there was a land owner who planted a vineyard. He worked very hard to make it nice: he planted a hedge around it to protect it, dug a wine press in it, and built a tower where someone could watch over the vineyard. Then, he lent the vineyard to tenants, in exchange for some of the fruit that they would grow there, and he went away.

When it was time for the fruit to be ready, the land owner sent three servants to the tenants to ask for his fruit. When the tenants saw the servants coming, they wanted to keep all of the fruit, so they beat one servant, killed another, and threw stones at the third one.

When the land owner found out what the tenants had done, he sent more servants than he had sent the first time. The tenants did the same thing to these servants! The land owner thought, "I will send my son to get the fruit. The tenants will obey him because he is my son!"

But, when the tenants saw who was coming to get the fruit, they said to each other, "He's the one that will own this land one day. If we kill him, we'll get the land to ourselves and will not have to listen to the land owner any more!" So, they threw the son out of the vineyard and killed him."

Then, our Lord Jesus Christ turned to the important leaders and asked them, "Now what do you think that the land owner will do with these tenants?"

They said, "Well, he will put them all to death, and let someone better be in charge of the vineyards!"

Jesus told the leaders this story to teach them a lesson. He wanted 4. them to know that they were not taking care of God's people in the way that they should have. He want- 5. ed them to know that He knew they would kill Him one day. He also want-6. ed them to know that God would take care of his people, his "vineyard," even if they would not. 7.

WHAT DO YOU THINK?

- At the beginning of this Gospel passage, what did the householder do, before lending his land out to tenants and leaving for another country? Did the tenants have all that they needed, to do what they needed to do to pay the householder?
- 2. How did the tenants respond when the householder sent servants to collect his fruit? What about when he sent more servants?
- 3. Why did the householder send his own son to collect the fruit? What did the tenants do, this time?
- 4. Jesus was telling this parable to some of the religious leaders in Israel. Why do you think Jesus was telling it to them? What did He want them to think about?
- 5. If the householder in the story represented God, and the land represented the people of Israel, who do you think the tenants represented? Who had been asked to care for the people of Israel? When the "householder" (God) sent His own Son (Jesus), did the real-life "tenants" recognize and honor Him?
- 6. Do you think the religious leaders were happy about what Jesus was saying?
- 7. What about you? When God (or an adult who is acting in your life on His behalf) lets you know about something that you are not doing right, do you ignore Him? Do you get angry? Or do you receive His correction and make changes to do what is right?


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

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
