JESUS AND HIS FIRST FOLLOWERS

Materials:

- * copy of song, "Fishers of Men"
- * play dough or clay
- * recipe for play dough or clay, if you choose to make your own
- * ingredients for play dough or clay, if you make your own
- * plastic straw
- * yarn, any color
- * plastic knife or other play dough tool
- * wax paper

Procedure:

- 1. After reading the gospel story to your child, take time to review the discussion questions following the story.
- 2. Remind your child that Jesus told Simon that he could become a "Fisher of men" if he would leave all of his belongings behind and follow Jesus. Discuss with your child what it means to become a "fisher of men". (To teach people about God and help them turn their lives to follow Him).
- 3. Sing the song, "Fishers of Men" with your child. Sing the song once for your child, then repeat the song, encouraging your child to sing along with you.
- 4. Give your child some play dough or clay to mold and shape.* Ask your child to mold some of the play dough into the shape of a fish.
- *Follow one of the recipes if you choose to make your own clay or play dough!
- 5. Practice making fish with your child. Use the best fish made for the fish neck-lace. The fish should be 3-4" in length. Your child may choose to etch a cross into the fish using the plastic knife.
- 6. Using the end of the straw, make a hole near the mouth of the fish. This hole will be for threading the yarn through and turning the fish shape into a necklace.
- 7. Allow the fish shape to dry on wax paper overnight.
- 8. Once the fish is dry, your child may choose to paint it if you used a plain color clay or dough.
- 9. Thread the yarn through the hole and tie together at the top to make a chain for the fish necklace.
- 10. By wearing the fish necklace, your child can be reminded that we, too can be "fishers of men" by being a follower of Christ and being a good example to others!

Fishers of Men

(to the tune of "Mary Had a Little Lamb")

I will make you fishers of men, Fishers of men, fishers of men, I will make you fishers of men, if you follow me If you follow me, if you follow me I will make you fishers of men if you follow me.

Play dough

- 1 cup flour
- 1 cup warm water
- 2 teaspoons cream of tartar
- 1 teaspoon oil
- 1/4 cup salt
- food coloring

Mix all ingredients (add food coloring last). Stir over medium heat until smooth. Remove from pan, let cool slightly, and knead until blended and smooth. Store in a plastic bag or airtight container when cooled.

Keep it Clay

This mixture dries VERY hard

- 1 (1-pound) box baking soda
- 1 cup cornstarch
- 1 1/4 cups cold water

Food coloring (gel is best or leave it plain and paint later)

Mix baking soda and cornstarch together then add water. Cook and stir over low heat until consistency of mashed potatoes. Remove the dough from the heat and cover with damp towel until it is cool enough to handle. Use for play dough or jewelry shaping or roll it out and cut with cookie cutter to make decorations. Store in an airtight container.
