

TAKE CARE OF THE POOR

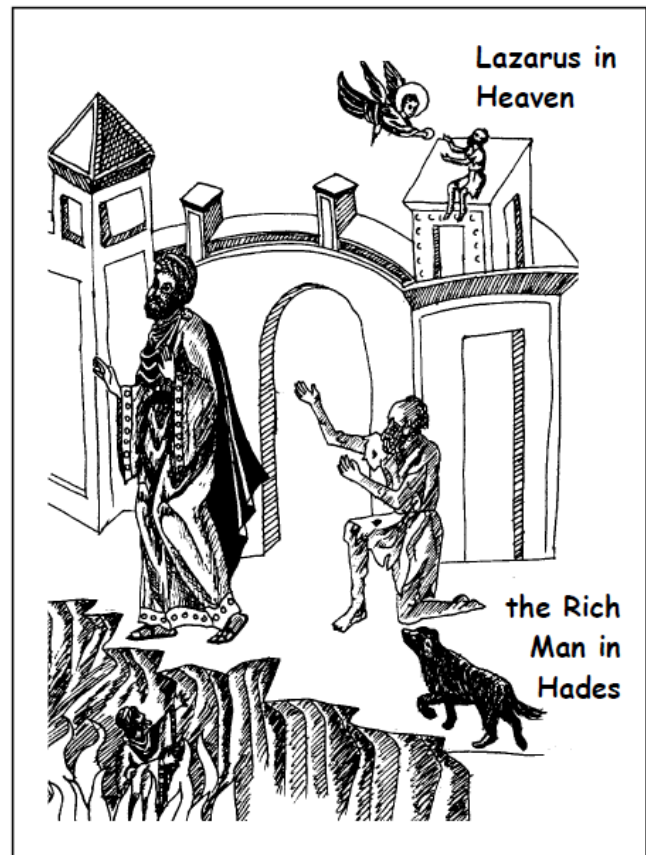

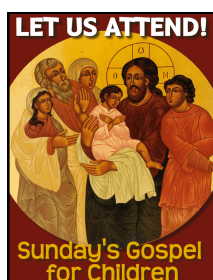
The rich man said, "Please send him to tell my brothers how they should live!" Abraham said, "They have learned that God wants us to care for the poor. They choose not to see."

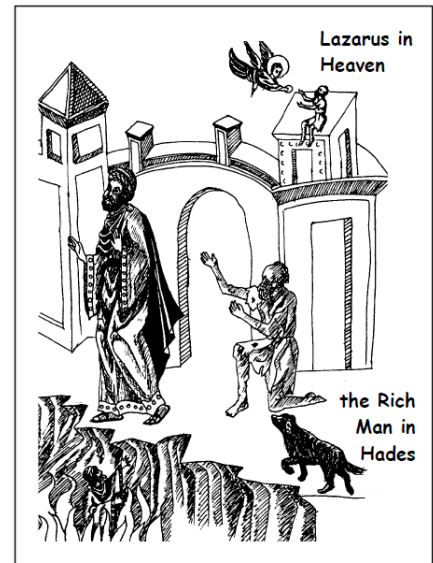
TAKE CARE OF THE POOR

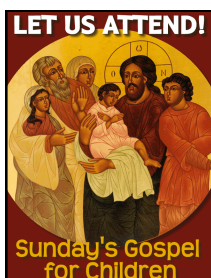
“But Abraham said, ‘If they won’t listen to Moses and the prophets, they would not stop being selfish even if Lazarus came back from the dead to talk to them.’”
