THE PARABLE OF THE FARMER

Jesus told this story, "A farmer went out to his field to plant some seeds. First, some of the seeds fell by the side of the road. They were eaten by birds.

Second, some of the seeds fell on rocky dirt. They died because they had no water.

Third, some seeds fell among weeds. They died because they were crowded by the weeds.

Finally, some of the seeds fell on good soil and grew and grew until the whole field was filled with an big crop of healthy plants."

The people asked Jesus what this story meant. He answered them.

"The seeds are like God's lessons. The birds, rocks, and weeds are like some people's hearts. Some people do not really listen to what God is teaching. They do not do what God wants them to. But when the seeds fell on good soil, it grew. The good soil is like the heart of a person who listens carefully to God's lessons, and does what God wants."

THE PARABLE OF THE FARMER

Materials:

- * birdseed
- * 3 paper/plastic cups
- * soil with lots of rocks
- * soil with weeds
- * "good" quality soil, such as potting soil
- * a marigold seed

Procedure:

- 1. After reading the gospel story to your child, take time to review the discussion questions following the story.
- 2. Prior to this lesson, prepare 3 cups of soil: the first cup should contain soil with lots of rocks, the second cup should contain soil with lots of weeds, the third cup should contain a quality potting soil.

- 3. Remind your child that the seed is like God's word. Give your child a bowl or baggie of birdseed and take it outside. Allow your child to toss it out for the birds. Discuss what happens to the seed as the birds come to eat it. The seed is taken away, just like the path in the story, which stands for the people who hear God's word but allow the Devil to take away God's word in their hearts.
- 4. Show your child the three containers of soil: the rocky soil, the weed-filled soil, and the potting soil. Give your child the marigold seed and ask your child which cup would be the best one to use to plant their seed so that it grows into a strong, healthy plant.
- 5. Discuss why the rocky soil and weed-filled soil would be poor choices for planting their seed. In the rocky soil, the plant may sprout and start out growing well, but it will eventually suffer because the soil will not provide what the plant needs to become a beautiful flower. These rocks are like the people who believe God's word, but soon forget. In the weed filled soil, the plant may sprout, but the weeds will quickly take over and the little delicate plant won't have room to grow. These weeds are like the people who hear God's word, but allow the things of the world to be more important.
- 6. Help your child plant their marigold seed in the potting soil. Discuss how this potting soil stands for those people who hear God's word and obey Him. With patience and care, this seed will grow into a beautiful flower.
- 7. Over the days and weeks to follow, care for the little plant with your child. Remind your child that in order to allow this plant to grow into a beautiful flower, you must water and care for it. This is just like our life with God. Ask your child what we must do to allow God's word to grow in our hearts (go to church, pray, do nice things for others, listen to God's word, etc.)

THE PARABLE OF THE FARMER

One day, our Lord Jesus told a parable, a story with special meaning. He said, "A farmer went to plant seeds in his field. Some seeds fell on the path. They were stepped on and the birds ate them. Some seeds fell on rocks. They started to grow, but soon wilted because there wasn't enough water for them. Some seeds fell in weeds. Thorns grew on the weeds and killed the baby plants. Some seeds fell on good soil. They grew well and gave a big crop."

Jesus' disciples asked Him what the parable meant. He said, "The seed is God's words. The places in the story where the seed fell are people who hear God's words. The path in the parable is like people who hear God's words, but the devil comes and takes the words away so the people do not obey God. The rocks are people who hear God's words and are happy. But they only believe God for a little, and then stop. The thorny place is like the people who hear God's words but start thinking about stuff on earth instead of about God. But the good soil is people who hear God's words and obey them."

WHAT DO YOU THINK?

- 1. What does a plant need to grow? What kind of soil does a plant need? Does it need water? How much? Does it need sunshine? How much? Does it need warm weather or cold weather? How do you know this about plants?
- 2. Do you think it is easy to grow a plant or difficult to grow a plant? Why do you say that?
- 3. If someone tells me my heart is like a hard rock what does he mean? If someone tells you your heart is like soft fertile soil what does she mean?
- 4. At school your teacher tries to plant seeds of information in you like the sower in this Gospel. How can you make your mind fertile soil for that seed? What kinds of things do you do at school to help learn the things your teacher is teaching you? (Examples: practice, homework, take time to think about it, be patient when it is hard to understand, listen to the teacher, pay attention to the teacher.)
- 5. If God is our teacher, sowing seeds of his message in us, how can we make our minds and souls fertile soil for his teachings? What kinds of things do we do at church to practice being good gardeners tending the plant God has planted in us? What do we do at home to practice being good gardeners? (Examples: pray, read scripture, be merciful the way God is merciful, help others, etc.)
