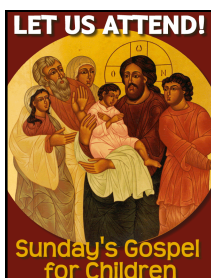

5. God wants everyone to come into the kingdom. But we must be ready. How do we get ready?



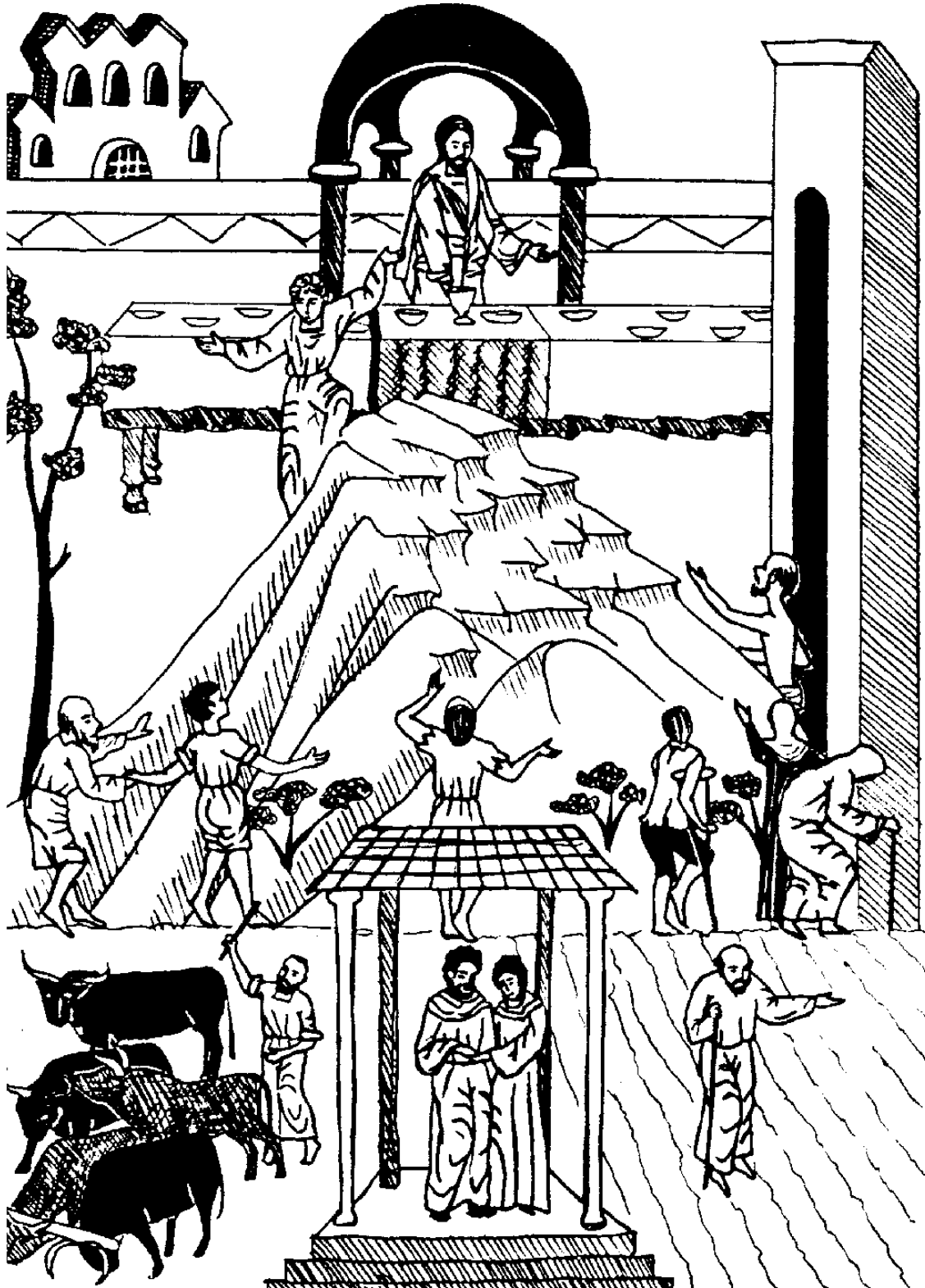
