*Lesson Length: 30 minutes (main) + 15 minutes (extension)*


**Key Ideas in this Lesson:**

- The day of Pentecost marks the official “birthday” of the Church.
- Pentecost is when the Holy Spirit descended upon the Apostles and gave them the gift of speaking in various languages.
- Pentecost is an event in history that happened long ago, but the Holy Spirit is still alive and well today.
- We are called to continue the work of the Apostles and continue spreading the Word of God by shining our light to others.

**Key Vocabulary in this Lesson:**

- Pentecost - The Birthday of the Church; celebrated 50 days after Pascha; a commemoration of the descent of the Holy Spirit upon the Apostles, giving them the gift of tongues (ability to speak in other languages) and the inner fire required to spread the Gospel throughout the world
- Evangelize - to preach the Christian Gospel

**Opening Prayer:**

Open with prayer. Suggestions for opening include **The Lord's Prayer** or the **Prayer Before Reading Scripture**. "Illumine our hearts, O Master Who loves mankind, with the pure light of Your divine knowledge. Open the eyes of our mind to the understanding of Your gospel teachings. Implant also in us the fear of Your blessed commandments, that trampling down all carnal desires, we may enter upon a spiritual manner of living, both thinking and doing such things as are well-pleasing unto You. For You are the illumination of our souls and bodies, O Christ our God, and unto You we ascribe glory, together with Your Father, Who is from everlasting, and Your all-holy, good, and life-creating Spirit, now and ever and unto ages of ages. Amen".

**Opening Activity: (5 mins)**

Start by asking the students to share the day and month of their birthdays. Write their names and birthdays on the board. If available, give each student a small birthday candle (or an electric candle). Carefully light each candle and then have students sing the Happy Birthday song together. They can insert into the song their own names or the name of the student whose birthday is closest to today's date. Have students carefully blow out their candles and return them to the teacher.

Explain that today we will learn about a very special birthday 'party' that happened a long time ago. The 12 Apostles were there!

Ask the students if they can recall the names of the 12 Apostles. Refer to the "Followers of Jesus" song that was included in the previous lesson. Write the names on the board and play the song as a reminder.

**Lesson Instruction: (20 mins)**

*A. Initial part of the lesson*

Ask:

1. Did you know that the Church has a birthday, too?

Display the icon of Pentecost.

Ask:

1. What do you notice? (Allow time for responses and write them on the board.)
2. What do you wonder? (Allow time for responses and write them on the board.)

Explain the various parts of the icon to the students. Be sure to mention:

- The old man at the bottom is "Cosmos". He represents the world. (The Apostles were "sent" to preach the Gospel to all the ends of the earth.)
- There is a flame of fire above each head to represent the Holy Spirit. (Like candles on a birthday cake. Fire can spread, just like we want the Word of God to spread. "Let your light so shine so that others may see your good work and glorify your Father in heaven." Matthew 5:16.)
- Originally, there were 12 Apostles. (Refer to the Apostles' names that are written on the board.)
- Pentecost is celebrated 50 days after Pascha each year.

Remind students that in the previous lesson, they were introduced to the Book of Acts which was written by St. Luke the Evangelist, almost like a Part II of his Gospel. We learned that:

- Jesus instructed His apostles to go to all parts of the earth to spread the news about Him.
- We are called to be like the Apostles to help spread the news and grow the Church community. That is what it means to evangelize.

*B. Second part*

Prepare to read the story of Pentecost (Acts 2:1-21.) To engage the students, call on individuals to "act out" the story as you read it aloud. The story will come to life when students are actively participating in the reading.

Some suggestions:

- Ask the students to make "mighty wind" sounds when you read verse 2.
- Pass back the birthday candles to be used when you get to verse 3.
- Act confused in verse 12 when the people ask, "Whatever could this mean?"
- Have someone to play the part of Peter in verse 14.
- As described in verse 21, raise your faces to the sky to call out to the Lord.

**C. Third part**

After engaging the students in the Bible story, talk about how amazing it must have been to be able to suddenly speak in a different language. Ask if anyone in the room can speak another language. Distribute the map handout and show the students how many countries there are in the world. Share the amazing facts that there are 195 recognized countries in the world with over 7,000 different languages spoken!

Ask the students if they have ever heard parts of our church services spoken and sung in different languages? Recall that at Pascha, we often joyfully shout the Paschal greeting, "Christ is Risen!", in several different languages.

Pass out the Christ is Risen handout or strips to 12 students (representing the Apostles) and have them proclaim it in the language provided. Remind students that we, too, are called to spread the Gospel by living a life in Christ and keeping His commandments.

The Holy Spirit dwells in us, too, just like in those 12 men. The Spirit is alive today as much as it was way back then. Now, it's OUR turn!

**Closing Activity: (5 mins)**

Give each student a flame to color and then have them cut and glue it to a strip of paper to be sized around their forehead. Use a stapler or tape to make the head band. While they are coloring, play the Troparion of Pentecost song as well as "The Birthday of the Church" song.

**To extend this lesson for additional time...**

Additional activity ideas:

1. *Learn the hand motions* to "The Birthday of the Church" song.

2. *Play the Troparion of Pentecost* and talk about what it means to be a "Fisher of Men." Have one student pretend to be a fisherman who reels in their classmates from their seats and up to the front of the room. Liken it to how Christ called His disciples to follow Him.

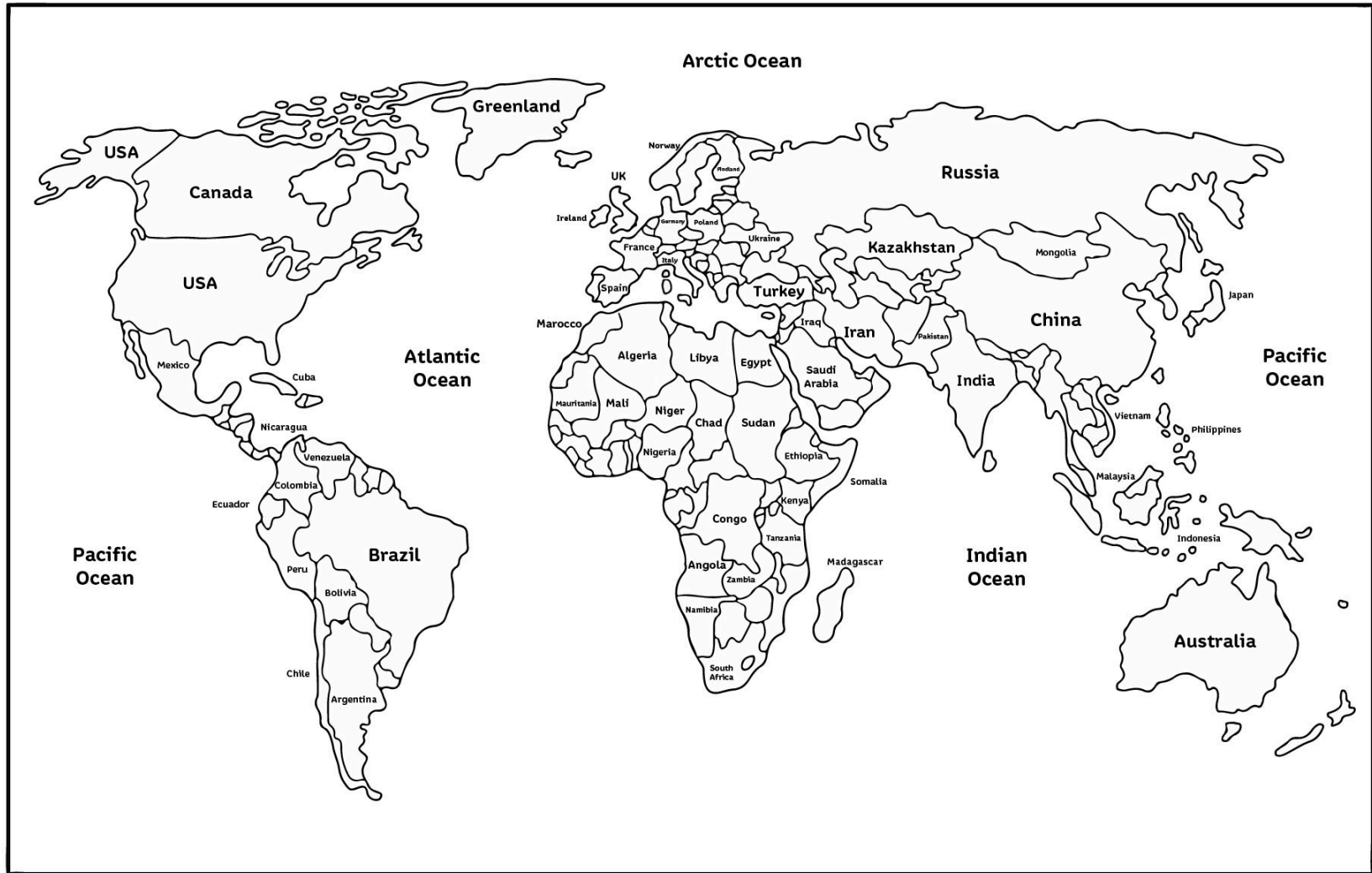

## Pentecost
