# "The Time of Advent 2019"

Dear Antiochian Women:

Christ is in our Midst! Glory be to Jesus Christ!

Abba Poemen said that blessed Abba Anthony used to say, "The greatest thing a man can do is to throw his faults before the Lord and to expect temptation to his last breath."

(The Desert Christian – The Sayings of the Desert Fathers, MacMillan Publ., New York, 1975, p. 185)

During our Advent Journey to the Nativity of our Lord Jesus Christ, we know that we are called to prepare our hearts as a manger to receive Him. We know that we are called to do this through our worship of God, our fasting, and our giving of Alms. Yet, we also know that as soon as we freely decide to do this, the thoughts, the actions of others, the life that we live both in and out of the Church, these things & others seem to almost work against us, often under the guise of "busyness!" These things that seem to continuously stand in our way are no stranger to us and are called "Temptations."

According to the late Fr. Thomas Hopko, of Blessed Memory, in his Ancient Faith podcast "The Temptation of Jesus" (Podcast Series – Speaking the Truth in Love), the word "temptation" comes from the Greek word, "peirasmon," which means "to be tempted" and "to be tested, to be put to the test, to be tried." Now, when one takes a test, or is tested, there is a right answer and a wrong answer. As Christians, the "right" answer is that which aligns with God's Will. When we choose the "wrong" answer, we have sinned, we have "missed the mark," or in Greek, "amartia." It is this "missing the mark" that has plagued God's Creation since the Adversary, Lucifer, turned away from God & sought to lead man away as well. Yet our God, the God "Who workest wonders," has acted to enable our return to Him, and this is through the Incarnation of the 2nd Person of the Holy Trinity, His Son, our Lord Jesus Christ, and the gift of The Church. The Church guides us into a "synergy" with God, in which we seek to join our will with His. This journey is called Theosis. And as soon as we seek to pursue this journey, the Adversary attempts to divert us from this path through "temptation."

Fr. Tom Hopko, in his podcast mentioned above, reminds us that God Himself has faced every temptation which we have. When He was tempted by the Adversary, the Prince of Lies (Matthew 4:1-11, Mark 1:12-13 & Luke 4:1-15), he faced 3 types of temptation, the love of pleasure (temptation to turn stones into bread), the love of glory (temptation at pinnacle of temple) and the love of money, material, power & authority (temptation of the earthly kingdom). Yes, He was tempted, but He rejected each temptation, seeking only God's Will! This is our story as well. In the remainder of this message, I wish to offer some guidance towards rejecting temptation & embracing God; as a supplement to the necessary Holy Mysteries of our Church (Worship, Bible, Sacraments, Fasting & Almsgiving).

Now, when we are tempted, when we are put to the test, let us remember that we can reject that temptation and choose the right answer. This we do through the Life of the Church and its ascetical disciplines, and this we do through our day to day turning towards God, which needs to be nurtured through giving attention to the life that God offers us "in Him!"

The Church has always reminded us that a bad thought need not be sinful...if we reject it. It is when we entertain that thought that it can lead to our rationalizing it and then following through with it. Allow me to share what I strive to do on a daily basis. When I have a bad thought, or when I have sinned, I usually know it immediately or shortly thereafter. As soon as I am aware, I make the sign of the Cross, offer a short prayer ("Lord, have Mercy!" / "Father or Lord, Forgive Me for !" / Jesus Prayer) and then I look around or think for a moment of a "gift" that I have received from God that I am grateful for! Have you ever received a gift that you really, really wanted? If you did, what kind of day was it? It was a Grrrreat Day, wasn't it? Why? Because you realized that the person(s) giving you the gift knew what you wanted, and loved you so much that they got it for you. God does this for us all the time. For example, the first time I remember using this discipline, I was driving downtown and running late of course; and there was this verrry slow driver in front of me. [It has been said that the hardest place to hold onto the Holy Spirit is behind the wheel of a car!] So, I was getting pretty frustrated. Then, I realized what was happening. I made the sign of the cross, prayed: "God Forgive Me! and then I looked up and saw green on the trees for the first time that year. That is a big deal here in Johnstown! What a Gift from God! Spring was here! Thanks be to God! Another time, I was in Church and just the way that the sunlight hit the gold-leaf in the beautiful Icon of the Platytera, wow, yet another glimpse into the Beauty of God's Eternity! Please try this! You will see that the more you strive to see God's Hand, the more "Gifts/Blessings" from God you will see. When we are thankful for a gift that we have received, we are humbled. And this humility allows us to turn away from the Devil, and turn back to God. This, I try to do, throughout my day. Some days, I use it a lot! Although it has taken me a whole paragraph to explain this, it can be done in mere seconds! (Please do not attempt this when you need to be focused on a particular task, such as driving a car, etc.)

Allow me to offer one other hint to remember in regards to our attaining Salvation through the Church. His Grace, Bishop NICHOLAS, at a Lenten Retreat for our Antiochian Women of the East, asked us a question: "What is your ultimate goal as a Christian?" There were many, seemingly obvious answers offered, to which His Grace, responded with "No." The answer he revealed to us came from our beloved St. Paul: we must finish the race ... if we finish the race, we get the crown! ... i.e. if we fall, we must get up! (2 Timothy 4:7-8 & 1 Corinthians 9:24)

My dear "Sisters-in-Christ," the Church has long taught that there is no salvation without temptation! It is through our temptations that we learn how to "struggle and to finish the race!" Lastly, when considering how we will face our temptations, let us remember this ... "Every depth has a surface, but not every surface has a depth!" God is with you!

"Therefore let him who thinks he stands take heed lest he fall. No temptation has overtaken you except such as is common to man; but God is faithful, who will not allow you to be tempted beyond what you are able, but with the temptation will also make the way of escape, that you may be able to bear it." (1 Corinthians 10:12-13) &

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


#### KH. KELLY PURDIE



- Additionally, Christmas gift bags are prepared for our church members, who find it challenging to come to church services regularly, due either to illness or advanced age.
- Ss. Peter and Paul Antiochian Women annually sponsor two children through the Children's Relief Fund, which is a ministry initiated by Father George Rados+, and now administered by Father Isaac Crow, our priest.
- Through the efforts of the Antiochian Women at Ss. Peter and Paul, poinsettias and greens adorn the Church at the Nativity, similar to Holy Week and Pascha when the women prayerfully prepare the Naach with Spring flowers.
- The Ss. Peter and Paul Antiochian Women, with the assistance from parishioners, have an active ministry to quietly support those in our parish with meals, prayers, and cards.
- We look forward to spending quality time during Antiochian Women's Month in March with the women of St. George for an afternoon Tea.
- An initiative called the "Angel Fund," an outreach of the Antiochian Women established in 2014, supports parishioners in need by providing grocery gift cards to bridge the gap for their food needs. Done confidentially, the Clergy designate recipients who would benefit from it. Anyone can contribute money towards this fund. The Angel Fund is also partially funded through an elegant Mother's Day weekend fashion show/luncheon that is a consistent sell-out, being held this year at Westwood Country Club in Virginia.
- A Lenten service project in April supported by our Antiochian Women, will help purchase and pack over 25,000 meals for local food pantries in Virginia, Maryland, and the District. The entire parish participated in this joyful undertaking that was completed in less than two hours during Coffee Hour!





# ST STEPHEN THE PROTOMARTYR CHURCH IN SOUTH PLAINFIELD, NEW JERSEY

The St. Stephen Women's group is a dedicated group of women that supports the church in many aspects such as spiritual, fundraising events and support in many church activities. Every year we supply turkey baskets for needy families in our area. We also provide new clothing and shoes for underprivileged children twice a year.

Additionally, we sponsor a child from the Children's Relief Fund in Lebanon. Last year, our "Act of Mercy" project was dedicated to Robert Wood Johnson Hospital's cancer patients. 


## ST. MARY'S CHURCH IN CHAMBERSBURG, PA


## ST. MICHAEL CHURCH IN GREENSBURG, PA

This past year, St. John the Baptist has actively participated in the Adams County Orthodox Fellowship, where our priest, Father James Hamrick, has led a book study on the book <u>Know the Faith</u> by Rev Fr. Michael Shanbour. We also witnessed our first wedding held at our parish this past July, since becoming an Orthodox church over ten years ago. As a parish, we also make a point to always throw a baby shower for each of our expecting mothers within our church; and therefore, we hosted a baby shower for our catechumen family at the

beginning of October to help welcome their third child, and first son!

At the end of October, we helped support and celebrate with our sister parish, St. James the Apostle, in Taneytown, MD, as they hosted their new church building dedication. His Grace, Bishop THOMAS was in attendance. During the weekend dedication, Father James Hamrick also gave a presentation on Celtic Saints of the Orthodox Church.

As an ongoing ministry, we contribute monthly to our local food bank. We have also continued our Family Care Ministry, which coordinates needed care for families within our congregation. This care includes coordinating and providing meals for families postpartum or following illness or surgery. In previous years, this ministry has even provided Christmas gifts and grocery support for a family with young children who did not have the means to provide Christmas presents or purchase holiday groceries.

As a Western Rite parish, we pray Stations of the Cross every Friday evening during Great Lent. Additionally, on the third Sunday of every month, Father James designates his homily as a "children's homily," in which the children are invited to the front with a message delivered directly to them. With the growing number of young children within our parish, we are also looking to expand our children's church ministry and are currently developing those plans. •

In honor of our patron saint, Saint Nina, we made our annual visit to Saint Nina's monastery to help the sisters with various tasks around to monastery.

Lastly, we held a Spring Tea, entitled the Naomi and Ruth Tea, to enhance relationship between the young women and the older women in our parish. Our own Kh. Meredith Burnet was the speaker, discussing growing into a woman in our current culture. The tea was well attended and received many






# HOLY TRINITY CHURCH IN LYNCHBURG, VIRGINIA


Our first priority is to provide a St. Nicholas party for the parish, especially the children. We will be making paper bag







Thanks to our President, Rula Osama Khoury, and AWE Officers, who organized the retreat, thanks to our Spiritual Advisor, Fr. Don Shadid, who spoke at the retreat, and thanks to the warm hospitality of the sisters at Holy Protection Monastery, this was a special day of fellowship and growth.

Early that morning we were blessed to take part in a beautiful Liturgy in the monastery church, which is dedicated to the Holy Apostles Peter and Paul. The chanting of the nuns in the quiet, candlelit church turned our busy minds to the depth of the prayers of the Liturgy.

Following breakfast and registration, Fr. Don Shadid, AWE Spiritual Advisor, gave an edifying presentation on the subject of the retreat: "Resisting Temptation in the Modern World."



Fr. Don explained how temptation doesn't necessarily lead to sin-it can be ignored and rejected. However, if we don't turn away from the temptation, then next we find ourselves rationalizing the suggestion, and we will soon have a list of seemingly good reasons why we should go right ahead and act on it.

As Fr. Don reminded us, our Lord himself was tempted three times by the devil in the wilderness — and therefore one sure line of defense, when we face temptation, is to turn to Christ in prayer.

Fr. Don also reminded us that there is no salvation without temptation. For if we do not have cause to struggle,

how will we make progress? And how will we learn to be humble and turn for help to the Lord if we do not recognize our weakness?

Father Don's presentation was accompanied by lively discussion, a delightful lunch with more time for fellowship, and introductions by the AWE President and Officers.

Later that afternoon we were given a tour of the Monastery. Our gracious guide, Sister Marina, began the tour by explaining the origins of the Monastery's patronal feast: the Protection of the Most Holy Theotokos. This feast celebrates an episode which occurred during the tenth century, when the great city of Constantinople, capital of the Christian Roman Empire, was miraculously saved from an overwhelming enemy fleet. At this time the Fool for Christ, St. Andrew, and his disciple Epiphanius, saw, during an all-night vigil in the Blachernae Church in Constantinople, our most Holy Lady Theotokos surrounded by an assembly of saints, praying to her Son and spreading her protecting veil over the faithful in the crowded church.

The Monastery's mountainside location was even more beautiful that afternoon, with Pennsylvania's fall foliage at its peak, and the monastery gardens beckoned us to a quiet stroll. Aside from the main building with the monastic cells and the Church of Sts. Peter and Paul, the Monastery also has a bakery, an icon painting studio, woodworking and candle making shops, and a guesthouse, as well as the garden, fruit orchards, and a greenhouse. #### The Purpose of the Great Fast (1)

Orthodoxy is above all the Church of the Resurrection, for its very foundation is the Risen Christ, and He is its one and only basis for Christian existence, life and hope. Unfortunately, many of our people do not fully experience this profound Joy of Pascha. This is because they fail to embrace fully a necessary time of preparation. For without ar "expectant preparation" the deeper meaning of Pascha is lost.





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
Koliva is an important part for the beginning of Lent. The first Saturday of Lent and the previous two Saturdays leading up to it are called the Saturdays of the Souls. Saturday, year round, is a remembrance of the dead, but these particular Saturdays the remembrance is intensified. According to tradition, Koliva is connected to Lent because of a miracle from St. Theodore the Tyro. In the 4th Century AD, Emperor Julian the Apostate knew that Christians would be hungry after the first week of strict fasting, which would make them go to the markets in Constantinople to buy food. Emperor Julian ordered blood from pagan sacrifices to be sprinkled on the food that was sold there, trying to force the Christians to paganism. St. Theodore the Tyro, who had died in the early 300's, appeared to the Patriarch of Constantinople, Eudoxios, in a dream, telling him that Christians should just boil wheat from their homes and sweeten it with honey, to avoid the polluted foods at the market."

The Antiochian Women Luncheon and Meeting was blessed by having His Eminence Metropolitan JOSEPH offer prayers and a blessing for our gathering. He offered the AWE warm greetings in this, his first visit to our PLC. He noted that the Antiochian Women Organization is one of the 37 departments in our Archdiocese, and is the most active department. The Metropolitan's message called us to make this PLC an opportunity for growth in our Faith. He said that, as we go about our activities this weekend, we should "... think of our salvation and that of others around us in everything that we do, otherwise it is merely 'a social thing' "— and he called us to remember that "nothing is worth the loss of our salvation"... that we must be "good examples"... and that we must "do everything we can to bring every soul, every lost sheep, back to Christ's Holy Church." He finished by saying: "I pray for you... let us do this together — you (the Antiochian Women), with the clergy, and with the bishops — one together, one team."

Our AWE President, Rula Osama Khoury, would like to reinstate the "Sister Church" concept and will work with Fr. Don on a new Sister Church list. Anastasia Nicoloudakis and Cynthia Long discussed the items on the table (candles and honey sticks) — the proceeds from the sale will go to support the Humanitarian Effort of our diocese of helping Human Trafficking victims. Linda Mirelli, from St. Philip's Church in Souderton, discussed the "Teacup Gift" fund-raising event. Fadia Juzdan discussed the gift from the NAB for each Diocese: a set of Orthodox Children's books to be raffled off.

In his presentation, our Keynote Speaker, Dr. Albert Rossi (Director of Counseling and Psychological Services at St. Vladimir's Orthodox Seminary) told us that a goal for our prayer life is: "to learn how to be still." Quoting Psalm 46, "Be still and know that I am God," Dr. Rossi also noted, "the converse is implied if we are not still — we may not know God." Dr. Rossi asked us to sit still for 5 minutes. 
### lacktriangle Diocesan presidents: Top 10 Things to Do lacktriangle

(#5) Remember the "THREE T's": TRAVEL — TALK — TIME

Don't be a passive President – make the time to reach out to your chapters by telephone or in person (ask them about the activities in their chapters; what YOU can do for THEM on a diocesan level; take notes so you can share with other presidents in the dioceses throughout the NAB). E-mails should only be used when you want to communicate with a large group; remember, the "personal touch" is very important as it shows that you really care. As the President, you should make Antiochian Women business a priority in your daily/weekly schedule. Speak frequently with your Vice-President by phone (at least two or three times a month). Always ask yourself: "What can I do to encourage a sense of community throughout my diocese?"





At the biennial Antiochian Archdiocesan Convention in Los Angeles in 1972, His Eminence Metropolitan PHILIP (of thrice-blessed memory) made the following motion:

"I propose, therefore, that a National Sisterhood of Charity be organized in the Archdiocese. The structure and goals of this organization will be defined in the future. I also propose that the President of this Sisterhood, by virtue of her office, should become a member of the Board of Trustees of our Archdiocese, and should report annually to this General Assembly."

On August 21st, 1974, at the next Antiochian Archdiocesan Convention, which was held in Montreal, Quebec, Canada, the organization envisioned by His Eminence Metropolitan PHILIP was

formally established. This "Sisterhood of Charity" was called **The Antiochian Orthodox Christian Women of North America** (AOCWNA). It's Constitution and By-Laws were enacted, and the governing officers, the North American Board (NAB), were elected and appointed by the assembly. The President of the NAB became a full-member of the Board of Trustees of our Archdiocese. She particularly advocates for the issues that face the women of our parishes and missions, and for charitable projects undertaken by the AOCWNA. She also relays the decisions of the Board and of our Metropolitan Archbishop to our membership across all of North America. She is supported in her work of advocacy and charitable outreach by the officers and coordinators of the North American Board, and by the diocesan officers.

In preparation for the assembly of the Archdiocesan Convention in August 1974, each Region of our Archdiocese created a Governing Board that mirrored the organization of the NAB. At the Annual Eastern Region Parish Life Conference, held in Seven Springs, PA, in July of 1974, the Eastern Region Delegates of the Antiochian Orthodox Christian Women of North America elected their first Regional Officers: Mrs. Evelyn Koury, President; Mrs. Norma Elias, Vice-President; Mrs. Samira Khoury, Recording Secretary; Miss. Mary Samen, Treasurer; Mrs. Bonnie Khoury, Corresponding Secretary; and Mrs. Darlene Esper, Public Relations Director. His Eminence, Metropolitan PHILIP appointed The Rt. Rev'd Fr. Paul Saliba (of thrice-blessed memory [+ July 1st, 2017], who was later to be elected as Metropolitan of Australia, New Zealand, and the Philippines) as the first Spiritual Advisor of the Eastern Region.

What follows is a record of the **Presidents & Spiritual Advisors of the Eastern Region** (an area which now comprises the Diocese of New York & Washington, D.C., and the Diocese of Charleston, Oakland, and the Mid-Atlantic). We are offering this Historical Timeline so that the leaders of our "region" will not be lost to memory. They were tireless in their dedication and leadership. May God bless them — and for those who have reposed: Memory Eternal! •



# LOSS & HOPE FOR THE GRIEVING

As I sit here and write this I can't believe that it is almost 10 months that my beloved husband, Subdeacon Nicholas, has gone to be with the Lord in the midst of preparing for my mother's one-year memorial service. Many had asked how were you able to handle so much loss in such a short period of

time, while still coping with my own health issues and now a caregiver for my father.

I remember people being surprised when I showed up for church on Sunday, while still making funeral arrangements; but I said where else would I be, I always find peace when I am in Church embracing the beauty of the Divine Liturgy with the beautiful chanting and choir singing. I still hear Fr. Joe's voice announcing the passing of my beloved Nicholas following Divine Liturgy and expressing how I was still mourning the passing of Mom.

Nothing can ever prepare you for loss, whether it is expected or in a lot of cases unexpected; a loss is a loss and hurts deeply through and through. It is how one handles the loss of a loved one, or anything for that matter, that gives **Hope** to those who are grieving to overcome the sorrow. So to answer those who asked how I have been able to overcome my loss, well I don't think I will ever be able to truly overcome the loss of two very precious and important people in my life. However, having the following facets in my life is helping lessen the impact of their loss: **Hope**, **Faith**, **Strength**, **and Love**.


**Hope:** Having Hope in the Resurrection comforts us Orthodox Christians in knowing that death has been defeated, even though the sorrow is real. Our faith does not separate the living from the dead; rather we are united in prayer.

"And now, dear brothers and sisters, we want you to know what will happen to the believers who have died so you will not grieve like people who have no hope. For since we believe that Jesus died and was raised to life again, we also believe that when Jesus returns, God will bring back with him the believers who have died." (1 Thessalonians 4:13-18)

**FAITH:** Many who grieve often lose Faith. Loss and grieving can cause us to question our faith, as we struggle to make sense of one's death. It is important to remember that grieving is not a loss of faith, rather it is part of the healing process. I have faith that my loved ones are at a better place and I will see them again. Truly my Faith Community has been the foundation that has been comforting and supporting during my time of loss. Additionally, I find comfort in reading the Scriptures to reaffirm my Faith and Belief in the Resurrection.

"May God, the source of hope, fill you with all joy and peace by means of your faith in him, so that your hope will continue to grow by the power of the Holy Spirit." (Romans 15:13)

**STRENGTH:** I came upon this image and Bible verse and found myself drawn to it like no other at the beginning of Nicholas' hospitalization that lasted for four months prior to his passing. Little did I know that this Bible Verse would be my guiding light defining my life this past year, as all things that I was able to do and achieve this year, especially dealing with the loss and grief, was only possible through Christ who strengthened me each and every day, especially the lengthy days and nights spent at the hospital by Nicholas's side. I am truly thankful, grateful, and blessed that I have been given this Strength as many times this past year I had been feeling survivor guilt, while feeling alone and isolated. Having Christ's Love in my heart has been my guiding strength.



LOVE: Let them support you. The comfort and love of family and friends, especially my church family, and most importantly, Christ's Love, has been very instrumental in lessening the impact of losing Mom and Nicholas. Let them help you when they offer, whether to just hold your hand, give a big hug, a shoulder to cry on, say a prayer, or just the time to talk and share a meal. God has placed these wonderful people in your path for a reason, to guide you and let you know that you are loved and they're there for you, that you are never alone.

"Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, the Father of mercies and God of all comfort, who comforts us in all our tribulation, that we may be able to comfort those who are in any trouble" (2 Corinthians 1:3, 4)

With the upcoming holidays, I know I will feel the full impact of their loss. But I have realized that I need to be strong, true to myself and honor their memory and continue to live life to the fullest, completing the goals and dreams shared, as they both would want me to do as they continue to watch over me. I will Give Thanks for my many Blessings while gathering with family and Friends. I will sing Praises and Rejoice in Christ's Birth! Glorify Him!

By no means am I a written scholar or a counselor but wanted to share my personal experience in the hope of helping others who may be grieving like I have been. For those that are mourning the loss of a loved one or any kind of loss, have **Hope**, **Faith**, **Strength**, **and Love**, and know that they are forever in your hearts not far away as you keep them in your prayers. Focusing on the positive things that we are surrounded with helps us to overcome the grief we are experiencing, filling us with joy, happiness, and love. Share your precious memories of the past with your present day to feel the presence of your loved one with you always.

May the Light of the Resurrection continue to guide you on your journey to healing.





# **OUR THOUGHTS DETERMINE OUR LIVES**, by Elder Thaddeus of Vitovanica

"Love little things, and strive for that which is modest and simple. The Lord watches over us, and He



is pleased that you long for His peace. Until the soul is ready, He will only sometimes allow us to see that He is present everywhere and fills all things. At these moments the soul feels such joy!... But then the Lord conceals Himself from us again, in order that we might long for Him and seek Him with our hearts!"

THE ELDER THADDEUS OF VITOVNICA was one of the most renowned spiritual guides of Serbia in the twentieth century. As a novice he lived in obedience to Elder Ambrose of Miljkovo Monastery, a disciple of the Optina Elders. From him Fr. Thaddeus learned the Prayer of the Heart and the selfless love that came to characterize his whole ministry to the suffering Serbian people.

Born in 1914, Elder Thaddeus lived through all the suffering endured by Serbia in the twentieth century. Over the course of two World Wars, during the Communist takeover, and through the NATO bombings of 1999, he co-suffered with his people. He taught, counseled, and prayed for all who came to him in pain and sorrow. His words

of love and hope provided spiritual balm for people from all classes of society.

In 2002 Elder Thaddeus reposed, leaving behind a large collection of his teachings, preserved by his faithful spiritual children. His life, teachings, and spiritual conversations are here presented for the first time in English.  $\clubsuit$

# ST. XENIA OF ST. PETERSBURG

# Commemorated on January 24

St.. Xenia lived during the eighteenth century and passed most of her life in St. Petersburg during the reigns of Empresses Elizabeth and Catherine II. Xenia Grigorievna Petrova was the wife of an army officer, Major Andrew Petrov. She became a widow at the age of twenty-six when her husband suddenly died at a social event. She grieved for the loss, especially because he died without Confession or Holy Communion. Once her earthly happiness ended, she did not look for it again. From that time forward, Xenia lost interest in the things of this world, and followed the difficult path of foolishness for the sake of Christ. The basis for this way of life is to be found in the first Epistle to the Corinthians. The Lord strengthened her and helped her to bear sorrow and misfortune patiently for the next forty-five years.

She began to wear her husband's clothing, and insisted that she be addressed as Andrew Feodorovich. She told people that it was she, and not her husband, who had died. In a certain sense, this was perfectly true. She abandoned her former way of life and experienced a spiritual rebirth. When she gave away her house and possessions to the poor, her relatives complained to the authorities. After speaking to Xenia, the officials were convinced that she was in her right mind and was entitled to dispose of her property as she saw fit. Soon she had nothing left, so she wandered through the poor sections of the city. She refused all assistance from her relatives, and was happy to be free of worldly attachments.

Xenia left the city of St. Petersburg for eight years. It is believed that she visited the holy elders and ascetics throughout Russia, seeking instruction in the spiritual life. Xenia eventually returned to St. Petersburg, where she was mocked and insulted because of her strange behavior. When she did accept money from people, it was only small amounts, which she used to help the poor. She spent her nights praying without sleep in a field outside the city. Prayer strengthened her, and in her heart's conversation with the Lord, she found the support she needed on her difficult path.

Soon her great virtue and spiritual gifts began to be noticed. She prophesied future events affecting the citizens of St. Petersburg. She became known as someone pleasing to God, and everyone loved her. They said, "Xenia does not belong to this world, she belongs to God." People regarded her visits to their homes as a great blessing. St. Xenia loved children, and mothers rejoiced when she would stand and pray over a baby's crib or kiss a child. They believed that her kiss would bring that child good fortune.

St. Xenia lived about forty-five years after the death of her husband, and departed to the Lord at the age of seventy-one. The exact date and circumstances of her death are not known, but it probably took place at the end of the eighteenth century. She was buried in the Smolensk Cemetery. People flocked to her grave to pray for her soul, and to ask her to intercede with God for them. So many visitors took earth from her grave that it had to be replaced every year. Later, a chapel was built over her grave.

Those who turn to St. Xenia in prayer receive healing from illness, and deliverance from their afflictions.

### **Troparion** (Tone 8) –

In thee, O wandering Strange, Christ the Lord hath given us an ardent intercessor for our kind. For having received in they life suffering and grief and served God and men with life,

Thou didst acquire great boldness.

Wherefore, we fervently hasten to thee in temptations and grief,

Crying out from the depths of our hearts:

Put not our hope to shame, O Blessed Xenia.
